North Shore Animal League America in Port Washington held its annual Pet Adoptathon May 1 and 2, a 36-hour event in which more than 620 dogs and cats were adopted. The no-kill shelter was one of about 2,000 shelters in 26 countries participating in the annual mega-adoption event.

North Shore’s event, presented by Purina ONE, featured Cesar Millan, the “dog whisperer” from the National Geographic Channel. The event included acrobatic performances by the Purina Incredible Dog Team as well as kids’ games and tips from experts in veterinary care, training and grooming.

According to Devera Lynn, vice president of communications, the event was successful despite unseasonably warm weather. “Even though both days were beach days, there was a constant stream of adopters, and they seemed thrilled with the selection and their matches,” Lynn said. “We were so happy to be able to save so many lives.”
